



Has your company experienced any barriers to trade or investments in India?

A bilateral trade meeting at Ministerial level (Joint Commission meeting) between Sweden and India will take place in India in May. At the meeting, it will be possible to discuss different barriers to trade: general problems that many companies experience in their trade with India as well as specific problems for individual companies.

The National Board of Trade has been asked by the Ministry for Foreign Affairs to prepare information concerning problems in India that Swedish companies would like to be brought up at this meeting. The National Board of Trade is interested in receiving information about barriers to trade in goods and services as well as investments. Examples of barriers are tariffs, quantitative restrictions, technical regulations, standards and testing, sanitary and phytosanitary measures, governmental procurement, intellectual property rights, investment barriers, barriers to trade in services etc. The types of problems can be different measures, the application of such measures or the lack of measures.

If your company wants such problems to be discussed during the meeting, please send us a thorough description of each problem by filling out this questionnaire.

- Describe the problems you have.
- Please specify what goods/services and/or investments that are involved.
- Does the problem concern any specific law or regulation?
- Has your company complained to the Authorities in India or have you received help from the Swedish embassy or the European Commission and, if so, has this given any results?

We would also like to know how you view India as a market/supplier/country to invest in and if you have any views concerning India's implementation of its obligations in the WTO.

In order to be able to follow up, it is important that you give us a contact person and contact information such as e-mail address.

The last Joint Commission meeting was held in Stockholm January the 30th 2015.
